# **Dr. Lily Peter Spring Celebration May 2<sup>nd</sup> at Benton:**

The Saline County Branch of PRA hosted a wonderful event for this year's Dr. Lily Peter Spring Celebration on Saturday, May 2<sup>nd</sup> in Benton. Our thanks to this group for their warm hospitality.

Opening remarks from Betty Heidelberger memorialized Dr. Peter who was Arkansas 3<sup>rd</sup> Poet Laureate (1971-1991). She was a successful farmer in Phillips County, a distinguished author, poet, teacher, musician, conservationist and philanthropist. Dr. Peter was a dreamer who made things happen. She managed her family's farm so well that it grew to 7,000 acres and she became a millionaire. Peter studied English at Columbia and Vanderbilt, received a master's degree from Vanderbilt, and also studied violin at Juilliard. She was a generous patron of the arts. Her published works are introspective, lyrical and historical poetry, mostly about the Arkansas Delta. Many of Peter's papers and taped interviews are in the archives at the <u>University of Central Arkansas (UCA)</u> in Conway. New PRA officers were installed and outgoing officers recognized for their service. Past President Cathy Moran received a plaque and gavel for her outstanding leadership over the past 4 years. PRA's own Jim Barton gave an excellent talk on editing poetry. We poets, he said, are "too wordy." He advised us to "cut-cut-cut" to the core points of the poem, use "magic" words that are most descriptive, and pick a title that stands out. He also critiqued several poems submitted by members and explained his suggestions. Each critique is only one person's opinion, he said. Jim also suggests we set goals to "dream big" individually and collectively. "Poetry is a gift to be shared," he said. Jim is an award-winning poet, published author, State Treasurer for PRA and National 1st Vice President and Membership Chair for NFSPS. One of Jim's "big" goals for NFSPS is to have poetry societies from all 50 states become members. Currently only 30 states participate.

Jim also was featured speaker at the Mississippi Poetry Society's Annual Festival in April and PRA's Dr. Lily Peter Spring Celebration in May.

Marilyn Joyner, David Hall, and Donna Henson (all from South Arkansas Poets of the Pines) recently presented a program "Poetry from the Garden" to Union County Master Gardeners. In January, SAPOP members also sponsored an "Open Mic Night" at PJ's Coffee House on the Square in El Dorado. Readers included Jim Barton, Marilyn Joyner, Janet Ryan, Jack Ryan, Donna Henson, and members of the community. Management was so pleased, they've asked the poets to return regularly.

Marilyn Joyner (South Arkansas Poets of the Pines) won two 1<sup>st</sup> HMs in the Springfield Poets and Friends.

Lee Ann Russell (PRA member at large – Springfield, MO) won a 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the Missouri Poetry Society Contest and gave poetry readings at the Arts Rolla, S&T Dept. of Arts, Languages & Philosophy and MO Arts Council Annual Community Poetry Reading at PoetSpeak in Rolla, MO for National Poetry Month.

Dr. Ed Madden (PRA member at large - Columbia, SC) was named the first City Poet Laureate for Columbia, South Carolina in January. Dr. Madden will serve a 4-year term to, "encourage appreciation and create opportunities for dissemination of poetry in Columbia." Originally from Newport, Arkansas, Madden serves on the faculty of the University of South Carolina, teaches English, directs the University's gender studies program, and leads poetry summer camps for students. He has published 3 poetry books and won fellowships from the SC Academy of Authors and the SC Arts Commission.

Karen Kay Bailey (PRA member at large – Blanchard, OK) won the Poet Laureate award from the Poetry Society of Oklahoma in March. She also is a featured poet for the Christian Women's Spring Celebration in Oklahoma City on May 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Cleveland County Historical Society in Norman, OK on May 23rd, and the Shelton House Museum in Waynesville, NC on June 13th.

Charlie Southerland (Free Verse Poetry Group of Mountain Home) recently published a poem "Eclipse" in the New York poetry journal 'TRINACRIA', and it has been nominated for a PUSHCART PRIZE! He also published in "Rotary Dial."

Pat Durmon (Free Verse Poetry Group of Mountain Home) won an HM in Lucidity Poetry Retreat at Eureka Springs. She also recently published poems in "Spare Mule," "MauMag," and "Whispers."

### A Bit of History – Bernie Babcock (1868-1962):

Julia Burnelle Smade was born in Unionville, Ohio in 1868, the eldest of 6 children. As a child, Bernie was free to roam through nature on her family's farm and indulge her ample curiosity. She began writing poems at age 6. The Smades later moved to Russellville, Arkansas where her father Hiram built a saw mill and her mother Lottie founded the Pope County Women's Christian Temperance Union. Bernie wrote her first essay at age 16 for the state Women's Christian Temperance Union against the sale of alcohol.

Upon graduation from high school, Bernie found a way to fund her attendance at Little Rock College by housekeeping, cooking and babysitting for the president's family. She earned high grades there. Then she met and married William Babcock in 1886. The young couple lived most of the next 11 years in Little Rock where they had 5 children. Bernie happily cared for her family as a dedicated mother. Unfortunately, Will Babcock died in 1897 when Bernie was only 29.

Bernie grieved Will's death through her writing. She was offered a teaching job to support her family, but she chose to write for a living at home while raising her beloved children. She was published within a year by a New York firm. Thereafter she was unstoppable. She became a prolific writer for passionate causes like prohibition, women's suffrage, archaeology, evolution, environmental issues, religions of the world, psychic phenomena, and histories of Indians and Negroes. Bernie found wrongs to be righted.

In 1903 Bernie was the first Arkansas women to be named in Who's Who for Authors and Writers. She established and led many of Arkansas's literary and historical societies, including: Arkansas Authors and Composers Society, Arkansas Federation of Women's Clubs, Arkansas Branch of the National League of American Pen Women, and the Arkansas Historical Society.

In 1919 she published a book about Abraham Lincoln's first love, Ann Rutledge. It was an international success. Thereafter, she wrote 4 more books on Lincoln and became the country's leading "Lincolnian." She authored over forty historical novels, served as editor of the first anthology of Arkansas poetry entitled <u>Pictures</u>

and Poems of Arkansas, and established "The Sketch Book," a magazine with content solely from Arkansans and one of the first written by a woman. In 1927 she founded the Arkansas Museum of Natural History at Little Rock's City Hall and was appointed its director. In 1935 she was named State Director of the Federal Writers Project. And in 1941 Bernie moved the fledgling Museum of Natural History to the Arsenal Building, the birthplace of WWII General Douglas MacArthur for whom the Museum was re-named.

Bernie Babcock retired from her directorship of the museum in 1953 at age 85, but she continued to write daily. She moved to a scenic home atop Petit Jean Mountain where she enjoyed the company of her children and grandchildren. She still saw herself as first and foremost a Mother. Her granddaughter Lucille Babcock remembered that her grandmother, "always stopped writing the minute one of the grandchildren came home from school," to walk with them and observe nature. Bernie died at 94, sitting at her desk with an unfinished manuscript in her lap. Forever the disciplined writer, she had lived a courageous life, supported her children, and tried to make the world a better place for them. Bernie had named her mountain home appropriately, "Journey's End."
